At the Feb. 26 monthly meeting of Women's Caucus, we discussed the problem of communication among the various groups and workshops. We decided that a coordinating committee made up of members from the different groups and others interested in attending should meet every second Monday night to report activities of their group and discuss future activities.

The first meeting was held March 9.

The meeting opened with a discussion of the March 14<sup>th</sup> march and two different opinions emerged. Some argued that Women's Caucus' endorsement of the march involved a change in strategy, which should have warranted a discussion in Women's Caucus before it was voted on. Also, the march would only appeal to a very small minority of women at the risk of alienating other women.

Others felt it was vitally important for Women's Caucus to identify with other groups in the march and recognize their common oppression. They argued that street people and students, who the march would appeal to, were important people for Women's Caucus to reach.

From the discussion, we decided it was important for Women's Caucus to work out the means of establishing a minority position and to study at a future conference Women's Caucus' relations with other groups.

### **REPORTS FROM PROJECTS**

<u>Educationals</u> – Karen Malo outlined educationals planned for March and April (see Calendar) and the need to include new members in Women's Caucus through the educationals. Report given on make-up of special kit to be given to new members as an introduction to Women's Caucus.

<u>Working Women's Workshop</u> – Jean Rands reported on the new pamphlet produced, Equal Pay for Equal Work, to be distributed at a shift change to workers at hospitals and other places with large concentrations of women. Leaflets of the situation of temporary office workers are to be distributed on pa-days at the various employment agencies and hopefully a meeting with interested workers will result.

<u>Abortion Campaign</u> – Betsy Meadley's letter to Health Minister Lofmark was approved. Dawn Carroll is going across Canada next week to do national organizing work around the abortion campaign.

Women's Artist Co-op – Pat Hoffer reported that the Co-op is setting up and lounge and reading room. Comfortable chairs, books and articles on women are needed. One of the honorariums from Capilano College for the two educationals to be presented there was designated to the Co-op, particularly for the use of Katherine Stone's slideshow.

The agenda for the monthly meeting was discussed with emphasis on the need to discuss past activities and matters of strategy.

Dr. Robert Mackaroff has been charged under Canada's inhuman abortion law. Vancouver Women's Caucus is calling a PROTEST DEMONSTRATION at the Police Station at Main and Hastings for 9:30 THURSDAY, MARCH 19, when the case comes up next. Everyone is urged to come out.

Because the case is before the Courts, it is important that individuals should not make public statements on it. The following statement from Women's Caucus will be distributed to people at the demonstration, to be used in talking to the press, etc.

## WOMEN'S CAUCUS STATEMENT ON MACKAROFF CASE

Vancouver Women's Caucus protests the charging of Dr. Robert Mackaroff with conspiring to procure an abortion. Canada's abortion law denies women the right to decide when and whether they will bear a child, and condemns at least 2,000 Canadian women yearly to death or permanent disability, through self-induced or "quack" abortions.

Although the federal government claims it is possible for any woman to obtain a legal abortion, the fact that a doctor is charged is clear evidence that the new law and the hospital facilities are inadequate.

To charge anyone under this law, when the law itself denied to women their basic human rights, is outrageous and inhuman.

Women's Caucus, together with women's liberation groups across Canada, is engaged in a campaign to remove all mention of abortion from the Criminal Code. The campaign will culminate with demonstrations across Canada, focused on Ottawa, on Mother's Day, May 10. In Vancouver, the demonstration will start at Lost Lagoon, Stanley Park, at 1:30.
